From Sensei: Loss & Searching

Within the past two months, we have lost four pioneer mothers from families within our Buddhist community. They were women who contributed to building up the foundation of our religious traditions here. Most of them were born here in Canada, and received an education in both Canada and Japan. They were bilingual, able to speak comfortably in both Japanese and English. Their families were immersed in both cultures, and they were introduced to Buddhism from the time of their birth. Their Buddhist values guided them throughout their lives.

They were impacted by the events of World War II, and were affected by the physical and emotional hardships of Japanese-Canadians, who were unjustly treated, and uprooted from their homes and communities. These forces played a role in the formation of the Japanese-Canadian community. Within this environment the early seeds of Buddhism, which had been planted during the early 1900's, grew and flourished. Families often had their own *butsudan* (family shrine) which typically became a refuge for them as they gathered together to chant the sutras. Buddhism became a unifying force within the Japanese-Canadian community. Their predecessors had come to Canada from regions of Japan where Jodo Shinshu Buddhism was strongly practiced – such as Shiga-ken, Wakayama-ken, Hiroshima-ken, Fukuoka-ken, and Kagoshima-ken. Our community recognizes the contributions that these women made over their long and productive lifetimes, and we extend our sincere condolences to their families and loved ones.

Deep bonds of mutual suffering and pain can become a unifying force and can sometimes lead to a channeling of energies for us to invest emotionally in things that our loved ones held dear, such as shared values, honesty, perseverance, and integrity.

A few weeks ago, we observed the Gotan-e Service, and shared the story of Shinran's life. For Shinran, the theme of loss played an important role in his search for spiritual freedom during difficult personal and historical times. Shinran did not have an easy life. He lost both of his parents before the age of nine years. He entered the monastery as a nine year old child, since there was nowhere else for him to go. The monastery was a safe place for a child in those turbulent political times. Shinran remained there for twenty long years, searching for enlightenment and spiritual meaning. I believe that his early experiences of loss and yearning for parental love played a significant role

in his ongoing spiritual search. Grief and loss of loved ones is a stressor that we must cope with at some point during our lives. The pain of grief is just as much a part of life as the joy of love. Some have said that it is the price that we pay for love.

We can all identify with Shinran's pain. Having experienced the early loss of both parents would be expected to have profound effects on his development and his outlook on life. We know that the need for love and secure attachment early life is necessary for growth and development. The bonds that we establish with our parents and caregivers are essential for our ability to develop normally, and to grow to become secure and well-adjusted people. From these strong attachment bonds between parent and child, the child builds up a set of expectations about future relationships, most importantly a sense of "basic trust" about the world.

Attachment can be observed throughout the animal kingdom, in many species of animals, not only between parent and child, but also in the bonding between adults. Scientists have described the effects of separating the Canada goose from its mate: Initially the disappearance of the partner causes anxious searching attempts to find him/her again. The goose moves about restlessly by day and night, flying great distances and visiting places where its partner might be found, vocalizing all the time with a three-syllable penetrating call. These searching expeditions extend farther and farther, and often the searching goose becomes lost, or ends up being injured in an accident. All these observable behaviors of the goose searching for its lost partner are very similar in nature to that of human grief.

Shinran Shonin, did not allow himself to be swept away by the circumstances of his life. The early losses and continuing challenges that he experienced throughout later stages of his life became transmuted and strengthened his search for spiritual truth. For

Shinran, this culminated in the Pure Land teaching. He showed us the way to bring Buddhist essence alive in the midst of busy household life. His words were clear and simple "*Just say the Nembutsu and be saved by Amida. Nothing else is involved.*"
Namo Amida Butsu.

This year's AGM was held at the Steveston Buddhist Temple and it was well worth attending. Not just for the welcoming Sangha and delicious food, but for the open discussions between the Temples across Canada about what is going on in their Temples and how we can support our Socho and the JSBTC elected representatives with their mandate to spread the Buddha Dharma.

On a personal note, I did feel more comfortable in discussing the issues of our Temple and the resolutions our executive put forth. This is because I feel that the newly elected executive will listen to suggestions and ideas from the delegates, that they will be open to change, and that they have made progress setting up policies and procedures that are making positive change possible. No I have not been "brain washed", it won't happen overnight, but the ship is moving in the right direction and I am happy we are on board and helping to support Jodo Shinshu Buddhism across Canada.

The benefits of being part of the JSBTC may not be apparent from the perspective of our individual members, and the annual assessment may seem to dissolve with each passing year. I can assure our membership that the elected directors of the JSBTC are working on our behalf to build a strong unified Sangha. Our contribution is working to see future generations who seek out Jodo Shinshu Buddhism can find it strong and vibrant, and we will benefit from the ground work that is being established. I believe strongly that each individual that sits on the JSBTC board is pure in heart and is sacrificed their time for our benefit.

We have burdened the JSBTC to look into the feasibility of a Full Time Bishop... something that ultimately may cause our assessments to increase. Change usually has consequence, but hopefully you will support the logic from their findings at our next AGM in Winnipeg Manitoba next year. Kent MacCarl has kindly accepted to be our local representative on this feasibility study.

The JSBTC has renewed a call to support the Ministers Retirement Fund and has set a goal of getting it to one million dollars. This is a worthwhile endeavor – something we all need to support and commit to. Understanding that there is only so much we can individually commit to, I humbly ask you to consider adding this to your list of great causes.
